THE RECTOR'S CORNER

REMEMBERANCE SUNDAY 2017

2017 was a remarkable year for Canadians as we celebrated 150 years as a nation while also enjoying Queen Elizabeth II's "Sapphire Jubilee".

Queen Elizabeth has reigned for 65 years and many of us can remember only her as our monarch. It also becomes difficult for the world to remember the 90-year-old Queen as anything other than elderly, albeit supremely distinguished. We mustn't forget, however, Elizabeth's record of leadership and public service reaching back to her youth during World War II. She did her part during the tumultuous years of World War II, even though a young princess, accompanying her sister and mother as they toured the British armed forces boosting morale whenever they went.

Princess Elizabeth grew up in the shadow of World War II and, with the country in crisis, she did not shy away from her royal duties. Her first solo public appearance came at the age of 16, with a visit to the Grenadier Guards. By then she had already been named Colonel-in-Chief of the Regiment - effectively the link between the infantrymen and the Royal Family. By age 18, changes to the law meant she could act as a Counsellor of State, meaning she would be one of five royals holding "the fort" in the event of her father going abroad or becoming incapacitated.

In 1942, at age 16, Elizabeth registered with the Labour Exchange – the British employment agency at the time – being very keen to join a division of the women's armed forces. Her father was reluctant to let her do so, but eventually relented and in February 1945, she joined the Women's Auxiliary Territorial Service, the female branch of the army, and was given the service number 230873. As "Second Subaltern Elizabeth Alexander Mary Windsor," she changed from her traditional garb while training as a mechanic and driver, eventually being promoted to honorary junior commander five months later.

In the Auxiliary Territorial Service, Elizabeth learned how to change a wheel, deconstruct and rebuild engines, drive ambulances and other vehicles.

On "Victory in Europe Day", Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret mingled anonymously with the celebratory crowds in the streets of London. In a later interview she said: "We asked my parents if we could go out and see for ourselves... we were terrified of being recognized ... I remember lines of unknown people linking arms and walking down Whitehall, all of us just swept along on a tide of happiness and relief."

In 1947, Princess Elizabeth accompanied her parents through Southern Africa on her first overseas tour. During the tour, in a broadcast to the British Commonwealth marking her 21st birthday, she made the following pledge: "I declare before you all that my whole life, whether it be long or short, shall be devoted to your service and the service of our great imperial family to which we all belong."



In 1952 she assumed the crown and a young Queen Elizabeth II began her royal march into history. She is the only female member of the Royal Family to have entered the armed forces, and the only living head of state to have served in World War II.

GOD SAVE THE QUEEN

Canada has a long distinguished military history. During 2017, we also commemorated two important military events: Vimy Ridge (1917) and the Dieppe Raid (1942).

Vimy Ridge was the first time on all four divisions of the Canadian Corps attacked as a composite formation. The Canadian achievement in capturing Vimy Ridge owed its success to a range of technical and tactical innovations, very powerful artillery preparation, sound and meticulous planning and thorough preparation. Though the victory at Vimy came swiftly, it was not without cost. There were 10,602 Canadian casualties resulting in 3598 deaths. Four Victoria Crosses (VC) were awarded for bravery.

The Dieppe Raid was the first Canadian Army engagement in the European Theatre. The Raid was designed to test the Allies' ability to launch amphibious assaults against Hitler's "Fortress Europe". The Raid was a disaster; 907 Canadians were killed with 2,460 wounded and 1946 taken prisoner. Despite the bloodshed, the Raid provided valuable lessons for subsequent Allied amphibious assaults on Africa, Italy and Normandy.

Let us be proud of our heritage and never forget the ultimate sacrifice of the men and women who have fought and died for our freedom.
