### **THE RECTOR'S CORNER**

(The third and last installment on visiting in hospitals)

This is the third and last installment regarding the current hospital visiting policies – I say "policies" because Horizon Health (the Moncton City Hospital) and Vitalite (the Dr. Georges Dumont Hospital) are not always aligned.

Basically, there are two things that need to be said:

First, in our denomination – the Anglican Communion – there are specific, Biblical practices which the Lord has prescribed for the health of our souls. These include Holy Communion, Confession and Absolution, and the Anointing of the Sick, and are to be administered by the clergy. In the New Testament, the Greek word for "clergy" is "presbyteros", which, translated into English, may be "elder", "presbyter" or "priest".

There is, of course, a formal process in which elders, priests or pastors are affirmed, scrutinized, educated and ordained – a process which involves the local Congregation, the Bishop and others. There is also a standard of behaviour expected of the clergy. This is set forth in the Constitutions and Canons of the Church.

The point is, from God's Word, we understand there is a certain pattern of ministry and government through which spiritual and religious care is administered. The Lord Jesus chose twelve Apostles. In turn, they chose others to continue the work. And so, the clergy are present in a Congregation to assist with "the cure of souls". For example, look at what St. Peter wrote to the Church in general (not to a specific Congregation):

"I exhort the elders among you, as a fellow elder and a witness of the sufferings of Christ, as well as a partaker in the glory that is going to be revealed: shepherd the flock of God that is among you, exercising oversight, not under compulsion, but willingly, as God would have you; not for shameful gain, but eagerly". (1 Peter 5.1-2)

### Here's another:

"Is any man sick among you? Let him bring in the elders (presbyterous) of the church and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord." (James 5:14, RSV)

So, point number one: from God's Word, we understand there is a certain pattern of ministry and government through which spiritual and religious care is administered.

The second point is simple: as Christians – those who hold to a specific belief which is well established through many centuries and cultures – we have a right to access the practices connected to our Faith. According to the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms, "Everyone has the …freedom of conscience and religion". (Section 2a) The analysis of this principle acknowledges what constitutes an infringement of freedom of religion, as follows:

"An infringement of section 2(a) of the Charter will be made out where:

- 1. the claimant sincerely believes in a belief or practice that has a nexus with religion; and
- the impugned measure interferes with the claimant's ability to act in accordance with his or her religious beliefs in a manner that is more than trivial or insubstantial." (from 'Charterpedia Section 2(a) Freedom of religion, <a href="www.justice.gc.ca">www.justice.gc.ca</a>'.

In conclusion, when someone is admitted to the hospital, they should not lose their right to practice their religion. For us, this means at least some reasonable, controlled and safe option to confess our sins and receive the assurance of God's pardon through Christ; to receive the Body and Blood of Christ in the Holy Communion; to speak with our priest or pastor; and to receive the Laying on of Hands and Anointing of the Sick.
