#### **The Rector's Corner**

Although we have all been aware of many changes within our world that have contributed to a decline in the Christian faith and culture of Canada, I found something written by Archbishop Michael Ramsey really helpful even though he was writing in 1968 from Canterbury, England. Fifty-two years ago he published, <u>God, Christ and the World</u> which begins as follows:

"Christianity in the West finds itself today in an uneasy relation to the new and rapid developments in contemporary culture. The changes of the last few decades have produced the phenomena known as 'the secular world' and 'the secular mind'."

Five decades later, those words still ring a bell for me. Ramsey went on to define these four assumptions of the secular mind:

- 1. "The *temporal* world is the only world which exists. Eternity is irrelevant and meaningless. There can be no idea of human values which transcend realization within time and history.
- 2. *Religion* is to be dismissed. It involves unscientific superstitions, and can contribute no authentic knowledge about the world. It has encouraged people to resist scientific progress, and the practice of prayer and worship draws into an unreal realm of phantasy energies which should go into the world's proper business.
- 3. Men's *knowledge* is based solely upon observable phenomena. Thus 'positivism', though not an inherent part of secularism, is very characteristic of it.
- 4. Finally, the secularist believes in *the autonomous man*. Man's own potentialities of knowledge and of the effective use of it suffice for all man's needs. True, man has his frustrations, but his dignity lies in his power to overcome them, as he can and will through the right application of the sciences to his needs. Religion gives not help but hindrance as it keeps man in a state of puerile dependence and holds him back from his maturity."

These assumptions, as described by the Archbishop, speak of an extremely limited view of faith and the soul. Please consider again

what the first assumption says: "The temporal world is the only world which exists. Eternity is irrelevant and meaningless. There can be no idea of human values which transcend realization within time and history." What Archbishop Ramsey wrote has come true before our eyes. Because our culture sees eternity as being meaningless, many people have moved away from Christian values, and the beliefs and the practices associated with them; such as Holy Matrimony, Holy Baptism; Holy Communion and pastoral care.

At the end of the first chapter of his book, Archbishop Ramsey concluded what we know and believe to be true in relation to the secular mind which denies eternity. He wrote, "The message of Christianity to the modern predicaments is one of transcendence. Man is created by God in God's image for a life of glorifying God…It is a life of losing self in order to find it. In Christ there is seen within this world the God Who is 'for man' in the totality of self-giving, and the man who is 'for God' in the totality of human response…. The truth of God's transcendence still stands. God is near, but He is different. God is here, but man is dependent… it is for the creature still to worship the Creator and for the sinner still to ask for the Saviour's grace. Without this, the new Christianity of the secular city will lose its identity as Christianity and will deceive itself and mislead its citizens."

Last week, and again this week, the Scripture readings speak to us about bearing good fruit in our lives.
