

The Rector's Corner

In last Sunday's Gospel, the Lord Jesus spoke about prudence – wisely using what we have for the Kingdom of God. In order to live prudently as Christians in this present day and age, we should be aware of what has been called 'the secular mind'. In his book, <u>God</u>, <u>Christ and the World</u>, Archbishop Michael Ramsey identified four aspects of the secular mindset, including this one:

"Men's knowledge is based solely upon observable phenomena. Thus 'positivism', though not an inherent part of secularism, is very characteristic of it."

What Ramsey said has come true in our culture: the truth is a rare bird! Please read this again: "Men's knowledge is based solely on observable phenomenon; thus, positivism is very characteristic of it". In a time which now speaks of a 'post truth society', Ramsey words have been proved. For many, all that matters is what can be seen or what can be positively spun to suit their immediate need. Objective facts are less influential in shaping public opinion than appeals to emotion and personal belief.

We rarely speak of truth and lies anymore; rather, we hear of 'fake news' and 'alternative facts'. In a nutshell, the secular mind sees truth relative and subjective. It is regarded to be the same as one's opinion; and, this attitude is not just in the world of politics or social media; it has infiltrated the Church. The Word of God -- revealed in the Bible -- is often given lip-service, rather than the position of respect and authority it was given in the founding documents of the Church of England and the Anglican Church of Canada. For example:

"It is not lawful for the Church to ordain any thing that is contrary to God's Word written..." (from Article XX, page 706, BCP of the Articles of Religion, 1562); and,

"We are determined by the help of God to hold and maintain the Doctrine, Sacraments, and Discipline of Christ as the Lord hath commanded in his Holy Word..." (from 'The Solemn Declaration 1893', page viii, BCP)

By rejecting the authority of God's Word and basing their knowledge of Christ on what is observable – on experience and feelings – many have destroyed their faith and limited their capacity to hope. In his book, <u>America At War With Itself</u>, Henry Giroux, a professor of English and cultural studies at McMaster University, suggests that the phenomenon known as 'post truth' is the result of our "unchecked individualism and the rejection of shared responsibility".

When all that matters – my highest, most important value – involves getting what I want, the truth becomes secondary. This 'shelving' of the truth leads me to re-define my reality according to my desires. And, in order to preserve myself, I invent more lies. Giroux calls this "the dumbing down of culture"; "the celebrity culture"; and "the culture of illusion". Ultimately, he says, rejecting the truth leads to civic illiteracy and the death of the imagination.

As the children of God and followers of Christ, we must be prudent with this understanding of how the secular mind thinks. I'm not sure that debate will accomplish anything; but our actions can, by God's grace, bear witness to the Truth. What actions? Actions that promote unity and shared responsibility. In a word, actions of charity. Why? Because these are what our individualistic society reject, to its own peril. Individualism is not sustainable – look at our mental health crisis; our suicide rates; our addiction rates; our collective anxiety. Individualism is not working!

So, without pointing a finger and saying "We told you so", the Church could be prudent and demonstrate what it means to be the Body of Christ – not a generic, politically-correct mass, but a dynamic, organic unity which operates by Truth and Grace under one Head, the Lord Jesus Christ. As children, we were taught the Lord's Prayer, including this verse: 'Thy will be done' -- God's will, as revealed in His Holy Word. If I seek His will, not my will, I will never despair of the Truth.
