"Not that we are sufficient of ourselves to think anything as of ourselves; but our sufficiency is of God; Who hath also made us able ministers of the new testament; not of the letter, but of the spirit: for the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life." II Corinthians 3: 5,6

The Rector's Corner

After all these years, I think I am just beginning to understand what the Lord Jesus meant when He said, "Love your neighbour as yourself". A scribe asked Jesus, "Which commandment is the most important of all?" In reply, He said, "The most important is, 'Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord; and you shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength'. This is the first and great commandment. The second is this: 'You shall love your neighbour as yourself'. There is no other commandment greater than these." (St. Mark 12. 28-31)

The second commandment is all about love – that's it. Jesus could have defined the love, but then it would have become too much like the Law. He also could have put some limits on it; but He didn't because that would have made it into a legal thing as well. He also decided not to define 'neighbour'. But it would have been so much easier if He had! So what are we left to do?

Well, in terms of understanding 'the love' part, our reference points have to include the Manger and the Cross. In both cases, the Son of God made Himself small and vulnerable for us. Actually that's a gross understatement: the Lord Jesus gave Himself up to those who hated Him and allowed them to mock Him, spit on Him, and humiliate Him. His suffering was real and agonizing; and His Death involved excruciating pain, both spiritually and physically.

Writing years after the Crucifixion, St. Paul explained God's Love in these words: "Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing, but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, hopes all things, endures all things". (1 Corinthians 13. 4-7)

That last line is daunting: "Love bears all things, hopes all things, endures all things". And yet, that's what a man and woman pledge to each other in Holy Matrimony. They promise to love each other "for better for worse, for richer for poorer, in sickness and in health, to love and to cherish, until death".

Our reference point regarding 'neighbour' has to include last week's Gospel and the parable of the Good Samaritan. Of all the people who could have helped the beaten, half-dead man, Jesus made it to be a Samaritan. Of this, Pat McCloskey, OFM (Order of Franciscans Minor) says this, "The fact that there was such dislike and hostility between Jews and Samaritans is what gives the use of the Samaritan in the Parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:29-37) such force! The Samaritan is the one who is able to rise above the bigotry and prejudices of centuries and show mercy and compassion for the injured Jew after the Jew's own countrymen pass him by!"

So, considering all of this, what Jesus said is totally radical: "love your neighbour as yourself". There are no limits placed on this love; and the neighbour definitely includes people I do not know or like. There is a certain amount of discomfort about that for me. But what can I say? God considered me to be His neighbour when He sent His only-begotten Son to suffer and die for me. As the Scripture says, "God commendeth his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us." (Romans 5.8)

I am not sure what we are to take from the increased presence of those in need in the area surrounding St. George's. Their needs are huge – and, in many cases, overwhelming. There are no easy answers; and I do not believe that any of the levels of government can fix the brokenness. Personally, I think this is a call to the Church – the Body of Christ has been given the Divine medicines which bring forgiveness, hope and healing.

Next Sunday, at approximately 1:00 PM Eucharist, there will be a meeting of those who are interested in thinking and praying and discussing a possible 'Ministry of Presence' in response to this situation. A simple, easy-to-access resource for some reflection and prayer this week is called "12 Neighbours". Just google "12 Neighbours" and you watch the 10-15 minute videos. There is no password required, and there is no log-in procedure. Just click and watch!
