The Rector's Corner

The Lord is at hand

The literal Greek translation says, "The gentleness of you let be known to all men. The Lord is near." The King James Version uses the word "moderation" which speaks of holding back; being reasonable and patient: "Let your moderation be known unto all men. The Lord is at hand".

Clearly, St. Paul meant everybody, not just fellow Christians. He said "all men – all people". The situation was this: the city of Philippi, noted for its gold mines, was located in the northern part of present day Greece. The Church there was founded by St. Paul in the year 51 A.D., during his second missionary journey.

Fast forward ten years. Paul was in prison, in Rome – about 1300 km away, travelling by land and water. It had been three or four years since he had visited Philippi and as one commentator put it, "He was beginning to wonder if the Church had forgotten him". Then, Epaphroditus arrived from Philippi with "gifts" (see Phil. 4.18) which likely involved an offering of money. During his long journey, he had fell sick and almost died. Needless to say, Paul was deeply touched; and when Epaphroditus recovered, Paul sent him back with a letter – his Epistle to the Philippians (adapted from Halley's Bible Handbook, by Henry Halley, Zondervan 1965).

In his letter, Paul wrote encouragingly to the Philippians, as a spiritual father. No doubt he had a sense that his time was short and that this would be his last communication with them. Near the end of his letter, Paul wrote the words that form today's Epistle:

"Let your moderation be known unto *all* men. The Lord is at hand." His point was simple: whether it was the "dogs" or the "evildoers" as Paul called them -- or whether it was fellow Christians – the way to go was with gentleness. St. John Chrysostom said this:

"It was probable that the Christians in Philippi would be at enmity with the wicked; Paul therefore exhorted them to have nothing in common with them, but to use them with all forebearance, and that not only their brethren, but also their enemies and opposers."

Thought for today: how does this call for gentleness apply in our situation as the Church today?

Amongst the faithful departed we **remember two men from Guinea**, Africa: **Thomas Bouré** and **Aaron Melville Gradon**. Both men were uncles of Marthe Gradon – her mother's older brother and her father's younger brother, respectively -- and lived with her parents. Incredibly both men died at home last Wednesday (the 9th) and both were buried at the same Service this past Wednesday (16th). Please remember Marthe and her parents in your prayers.
