

The Rector's Corner

As we prepare to begin the 'How Shall We Forgive' series tomorrow night with Archbishop Edwards and MacDonald, I have been thinking about Brady Francis and Maurice Johnson and Chief Aaron Sock. You will remember hearing their story. Brady was standing on the shoulder of Saint-Charles South Road at 9:30 PM, Saturday, February 24th, 2018. Maurice accidentally hit him while driving by in his 2003 GMC Sierra pick-up; and, thinking that he had hit a deer, kept driving. Severely injured, Brady later died in hospital. Two years afterwards, following Maurice's acquittal in the Moncton Courthouse, Chief Sock said, 'Don't ask what we (First Nations' Peoples) are going to do; let me ask, 'What is Canada going to do?'

Those were not his exact words, but I remember thinking, 'He's right. What is the Church going to do?' Brady's grandfather, Kenneth, had pleaded for Elsipogtog to have patience when Maurice's truck was released by investigators. He said, "All we want is justice." In other words, we do not want rioting or revenge.

In his book, <u>Evil and the Justice of God</u>, Bishop N.T. Wright reflects on the words from the Lord's Prayer, "deliver us from evil". He asks:

"When God eventually makes the new heavens and new earth promised in Revelation 21...how is it that there will not only be no evil but no residual anger or resentment, no burden of guilt still to bear, for all the evil that has happened down the long millennia to that point?"

That's a huge question that goes far, far beyond the capacity of any legal system. Not even an army of the world's best lawyers could deliver the justice and reconciliation our fallen race requires. The answer – the solution – lies in the Death and Resurrection of Christ. In the Death of Jesus, evil is confronted and defeated, even though it continues to raise its ugly head. "But second," says Wright "based on the death of Jesus, God will forgive; and with that forgiveness God will not only release the world from its burden of guilt but will also, so to speak, release himself from the burden of always having to be angry with a world gone wrong".

"Forgiveness," as Wright rightly says, "is a central part of deliverance from evil". Without forgiveness, evil continues to hold power. It retains a foothold in our lives as individuals and in our life together as the children of God – the Church. We have learned this, perhaps without even knowing it, in the words of the Lord's Prayer: "forgive us our trespasses as we forgive them that trespass against us".

Chief Sock asked what Canada is going to do about injustice. What about the Church? What are we going to do? This was a question which the Prophet Micah laid before the people of Israel and Judah: "He has told you, O man, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?"(6.8) God's justice requires truth and grace. It involves forgiveness; so we let us renew our understanding of it with the Archbishops, beginning tomorrow night. You can come to the Church or watch on-line.
