## **The Rector's Corner**



This is the fourth installment in a series on Indigenous leaders in the Church. Today, let's remember the Rev. Canon Angus Sewap, a Priest in the Diocese of Saskatchewan who died on December 3, 2020 from complications of the COVID-19 virus.

Angus was Cree, and born on November 20, 1948. Aside from the five years he spent studying in Prince Albert to become an electrician, and the time he spent preparing for ordination, Angus

lived his whole life in Pelican Narrows which is situated at the narrows that join Mirond and Pelican Lakes. The Cree name for this area is Wapawikoscikan which means "The Narrows of Fear".

His ordained ministry lasted three decades, during which he worked on a non-stipendiary, or unpaid, basis. He was described as "a humble servant" and a "real dedicated priest". When he wasn't reading the Bible, he spent much of his time outdoors. He was a talented musician known for playing and singing gospel hymns on guitar. Mark MacDonald, our national Indigenous Archbishop, spoke of Canon Sewap's quiet authority:

"There is, I think, among elders a quiet authority. It is not assertive. It doesn't speak out or stand out. But it permeates a place and a people, and it is an authority that helps hold people together.

"Angus, by many people's standards, would be described as very quiet. But his presence was in the community and beyond. Wherever you encountered him, and even when you weren't encountering him physically, his presence was very powerful. It had authority, it had a graciousness, it had a kindness.... He was someone who kept us together, and someone [with whom] you felt good about what you were doing because he was involved with it." In 2012, Canon Sewap's wife, Liza, died. Then, due to complications from diabetes, he underwent a double leg amputation and was confined to a wheelchair. But that didn't stop him from working in the Lord's service. For example, this excerpt from the March 2020 *Saskatchewan Anglican* newspaper describes the first annual ecumenical service in Pelican Narrows. It began in a school auditorium with a Gospel Jamboree concert.

"During the singing of the opening hymn the visiting clergy, elders and leaders of the community processed into the room. The elders then proceeded to smudge the congregation. One of those entering placed the Bible in a place of honour in the centre of the worshipping community. A canoe was placed in the middle of the gymnasium. It is a symbol of importance as a way of life from the past, the present and the future existence of the native culture. The reading in the service describes a perilous sea voyage by the Apostle Paul. The canoe is symbolic of the sometimes-tempestuous journey Christians make together towards unity. During the prayers of the people eight paddles were brought into the assembly by members of different communities. Each paddle had a single word: Reconciliation, Enlightenment, Hope, Trust, Strength, Hospitality, Conversion and Generosity. The presentation of the oar introduced each of the petitions, followed by a time of silent prayer. It would have been very moving to be a part of this ceremony. The leader began the prayers with the following: "We cannot face the storms of life alone. A boat moves forward when all row together. In the face of difficulties, we recognize the need to pull together and to unite our efforts". The prayers ended with a prayer asking God for help with social problems in the communities such as alcohol, drug dealers, violence, suicides, alcohol and verbal abuse, and poverty. All the participants joined hands for the final prayer in the words Jesus taught them, Our Father .... Everyone then shared the peace. The night ended with a generous and delicious feast including fried fish and bannock and two birthday cakes one to honour a very spry and dear local elder and the other for the archbishop."

Today's closing word goes to Archbishop MacDonald: Angus was "very generous with his time and every aspect of his being. He will be deeply missed. We expect that his mantle, like Elijah—his spiritual authority and presence will fall on someone, maybe many people. But his ministry will live on."
