Old candles of all shapes and sizes, please: On February 2<sup>nd</sup> the Church Calendar marks 'The Presentation of Christ in the Temple, and the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary' as a red letter, holy day. In obedience to Jewish law, the Blessed Virgin Mary went to the Temple in Jerusalem to be purified 40 days after the birth of her son, and to present him to God as her firstborn (Luke 2:22–38). Once inside, the Christ Child was recognized by Simeon, who called JESUS 'A light to lighten the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel'. From his words, the Church, for centuries, has distributed candles on Feb. 2<sup>nd</sup> for use in homes, and as a reminder of Jesus, the Light of the world. With all that in mind, we would gladly receive your old candles and bits of candles, please, before Tuesday, January 25th. We plan to melt them, and make new candles from the wax. If you are interested in helping, please let us know! Old candles may be dropped off at the Church between 7:30am and 12:30pm, Monday to Friday. There will also be a box in the Church Entry for Sunday drop offs.

# **The Rector's Corner**

There is a very old family tradition called the King's Feast. Rooted in today's Gospel and Jesus' First Miracle, it is still observed in many countries. Following the theme of the marriage feast in Cana, each family hosted its own feast, and chose one of its members to be *King*. At the end of the meal, a cake was served, and whoever took the piece which had a certain secret mark, was proclaimed the *King* of the day. (My grandmother used to wrap a quarter in wax paper and hide it in the cake.) Then, two portions of the cake were reserved for the poor – this was a way to pay honour to the Infant Jesus and His Blessed Mother, the Virgin Mary.

There is much more that could be said about this, but, the idea was to tell the story of Jesus' first miracle and preserve it in the memory of the children.

As we think about the turning of the water into wine, it is important to underline two things right off the bat: it *was* Jesus' first miracle, or 'sign' as St. John called it; and, it was done at a wedding. In other words, His choice of that wedding for His first miracle was deliberate, not random. Why? Well, on the one hand, by turning water into wine at a wedding, Jesus pointed to the importance of Christian Marriage and the family unit. It is in marriage, afterall, and through our family relationships, that we begin to learn the depth and width and length and breadth of Charity – the unselfish, sacrificial Love of Christ.

But there is something else about Jesus' first miracle. Perhaps He chose to perform it at a wedding because of the fact that He had come from Heaven to take a bride for Himself. St. Paul spoke of this great mystery in his Epistle to the Ephesians. He likened the Lord to a groom, and the Church to His bride, quoting this passage from the Book of Genesis: "For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh"; then he said, "This mystery is a profound one, and I am saying that it refers to Christ and the Church". (Ephesians 5. 31-32)

Reflecting on this, there is something really wonderful that follows: in coming to take the Church as His bride, Jesus knew that she was sick and dying. So, in order to save her, He sacrificed Himself. He loved His bride so much that He did that. And, through His Sacrifice, His bride was saved. In fact, her life-threatening disease was cured; and

her condition was permanently changed. Her Husband's Love changed her life!

This is one way of thinking about the miracle presented in today's Gospel. Just as the water was changed, so the Lord wants to change us. He wants to give us new life – the new life of His Grace and Truth which is eternal. He wants to heal our broken hearts, and forgive our sins, and restore us with His Hope. As English poet, song-writer and Priest, Malcolm Guite put it, our merciful Lord wants "to move us from the mere outward purity, symbolised by the water for ritual washing, to a transformation of inward joy, symbolised by the wine".

He is referring to the ritual hand-washing which guests performed before attending a Jewish wedding feast. This was done with a special cup called 'the negel vasser'. Using it, water would be poured on each hand three times, alternating hands. Of course, that would require a lot of water! Thus today's Gospel mentions the six stone water-pots which held between 20-30 gallons each. But the point is, just as Jesus changed the substance of that water, so He wants to change us. He does not want just our hands to be clean, He wants to cleanse our hearts. He wants to illuminate our hearts of all darkness, and purify our souls. And only He can do that because He is our only Bridegroom.
