

The Rector's Corner

St. George has been formally remembered on the corner of Church and Queen Streets in Moncton for 170 years. Born in Cappadocia of Christian parents – in what is now a central region in Turkey – we can imagine that George explored the caves that are so prominent in that area and no doubt swam in the Black Sea.

George's mother was from Palestine – a good 500 mile distance, as the crow flies -- and, her family owned a sizable property there. So, when her husband died, she and George went 'home'. At that point, George enlisted in the army. He was healthy and strong, and embraced the life of a soldier. He rose in the ranks to become a senior officer – a full Colonel. And, as one historian wrote, "By his courage and conduct he was soon preferred to higher stations by the (Roman) Emperor Diocletian."

However, it wasn't long before the honeymoon was over. Diocletian was a military man. Although born into a relatively poor family, he had become well respected for his abilities and fearlessness in battle as cavalry commander. As Emperor, he was strategic in dividing the Roman Empire into four regions and appointing junior emperors as overseers. It seems as that, in addition to his physical skills, Diocletian was a planner; and, for some reason he saw the Church as a growing and future threat. So, in 303, the Diocletian, and his three colleagues: Maximian, Galerius, and Constantius issued a series of edicts rescinding Christians' legal rights and demanding that they comply with traditional religious practices. These edicts were posted for everyone to read in Nicomedia, the capital city of the Eastern Roman Empire; and, we can only try to imagine the blood shed that ensued.

Enter George, the Christian and Army Colonel. Some say that he tore down the edicts. Whether or not that's true, George did confront Diocletian personally about his decision to wage war on the Church. Truly it was an act of loyalty and bravery. Immediately, he was thrown into prison and tortured with terrible and cruel methods. George remained constant – even when he was led through the city streets on his way to being beheaded.

But that was not the end of George. He appeared to the Christian Army before the Battle of Antioch during the First Crusade in 1098. Despite their hunger and exhaustion, the Christians were victorious, and George's honour increased as the patron Saint of the military.

As we remember St. George this year, may the Lord convict us of the need for courage. Courage, or fortitude – the spirit of might – is a gift of the Holy Spirit. Because of Jesus' Resurrection, the Holy Ghost has come to dwell in us. Through Him, we have the strength and power to withstand the evil one. Let us, then, stand up for Jesus, as the old hymn says, and for all that is good and true and holy. And, may this corner of Church and Queen, which has been consecrated and set aside for God, and which bears the name of St. George, be a place where the dark forces are always confronted.

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!
