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

The Rector's Corner

In the parable from last week's Gospel, the rich man did not end up in hell because he was rich. And Lazarus did not end up in Heaven because he was poor. The rich man ended up in torment because he did not love the poor man. Imagine: everyday Lazarus laid in plain view and was ignored. The neighborhood dogs recognized his needs and licked his sores; but the rich man ignored him, eating and drinking and clothing himself in finery, as though his comfort and pleasure was all that mattered.

The parable paints an extreme contrast, and someone might say, "That would never happen in real life." But it *was* happening, and it continues to happen – that's why Jesus raised it. The key to the parable lies with its audience. Jesus was speaking to the Pharisees:

"The Pharisees, who were lovers of money...scoffed at Him. But He said to them, 'You are those who justify yourselves before men, but God knows your hearts; for what is exalted among men is an abomination in the sight of God'". (St. Luke 16.14-15)

In his commentary on this Gospel, Bishop N.T. Wright has this helpful word: "The point (of the parable) is then that the Pharisees, being themselves lovers of money, were behaving to the people Jesus was welcoming exactly like the rich man was behaving to Lazarus....All Jesus is asking them, is to do what Moses and the prophets would have said....If they do not, then not even someone rising from the dead will bring them to their senses...One day soon...the law and the prophets will all come true in a new way, as Jesus Himself rises again, opening the door to God's new age in which all wrongs will be put right."

The thing is, this parable clearly set before us how the Kingdom of God has values that are polar opposite from the world. As followers of Christ and children of God – as members of the Church – we need to be on our toes about this, because it is so easy to fall in with the culture. As we read at Morning Prayer this past Friday, "The end of all things is at hand: be ye therefore sober, and watch unto prayer." (1 St. Peter 4.7)

This sense of watchfulness and urgency for God's Kingdom was captured in the following poem by Sir Francis Drake:

"Disturb us, Lord, when we are too well pleased with ourselves, when our dreams have come true because we have dreamed too little; when we arrived safely because we sailed too close to the shore.

Disturb us, Lord, when with the abundance of things we possess we have lost our thirst for the waters of life; having fallen in love with life, we have ceased to dream of eternity, and in our efforts to build a new earth, we have allowed our vision of the new Heaven to dim.

Disturb us, Lord, to dare more boldly, to venture on wider seas where storms will show your mastery; where losing sight of land, we shall find the stars. We ask You to push back the horizons of our hopes; and to push into the future in strength, courage, hope, and love. AMEN"

As we move into these summer months, the Scripture Lessons will focus on our growth in the holy and perfect Love of God, the Everlasting Trinity. May we seek to grow in the new life of His Love so that Lazarus is no longer a beggar but a brother in Christ.
