St. George's Church is a downtown spiritual center where traditional Anglican liturgy, parishioners and the needs of our community are valued.

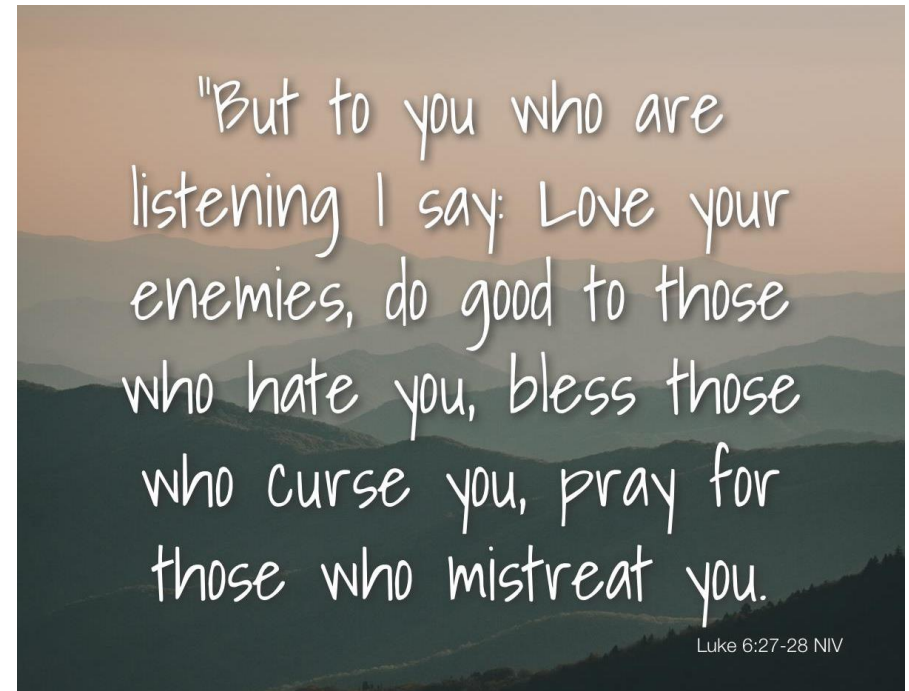

The Rector's Corner

We have begun to pack for our move out of the Rectory, and in the process of going through some books, I came across The Christian Mind by Harry Blamires. According to Wikipedia, he was “once head of the English department at King Alfred's College in Winchester, England. He started writing in the late 1940s at the encouragement of his friend and mentor C. S. Lewis, who had been his tutor at Oxford University”.

It was published almost 60 years ago, but these words on the first page, although a bit crusty, jumped out at me:

“There is no longer a Christian mind. There is still, of course, a Christian ethic, a Christian practice, and a Christian spirituality. As a moral being, the modern Christian subscribes to a code other than that of the non-Christian. As a member of the Church, he undertakes obligations and observations ignored by the non-Christian. As a spiritual being, in prayer and meditation, he strives to cultivate a dimension of life unexplored by the non-Christian. But as a *thinking* being the modern Christian has succumbed to secularization. He accepts religion – its morality, its worship, its spiritual culture; but he rejects the religious view of life, the view which sets all earthly issues within the context of the eternal, the view which relates all human problems – social, political, cultural – to the doctrinal foundations of the Christian Faith, the view which sees all things here below in terms of God's supremacy and earth's transitoriness, in terms of Heaven and Hell.”

He goes on to say that “Christians have accepted a frame of reference constructed by the secular mind and set of criteria reflecting secular evaluations”.

His cautions about a worldly “frame of reference” and a “set of criteria reflecting secular evaluations (or values)” made me stop and think: what is my frame of reference in this challenging time for the Church? What criteria am I using to evaluate the health of the Church?

According to Blamires, a prime mark of the Christian mind is that “it cultivates the eternal perspective....It is supernaturally oriented, and brings to bear upon earthly considerations the fact of Heaven and the fact of Hell”. On the contrary, “the modern rejection of

Christianity...has at its heart a total failure to sense the dependence of man, the creatureliness of man.”

He's right. We are just people. We are the creatures, not the Creator; so, we are completely dependent upon God for life. We are also completely dependent on Him for redemption – for forgiveness and for the healing of our relationship with Him and with one another. Without the Blood of the Lord Jesus Christ shed for us on the Cross, we have no hope. With Him, and in Him, we have everlasting Life!

In last week's Gospel, Jesus presented the disciples with a lesson on the Christian mind. They had fished all night and caught nothing. They were tired and ready to come in. Nevertheless, at Jesus' word, Peter put the net out again, on the other side of the boat. From a human perspective, it didn't make sense; but from a 'faith perspective' it was the right thing to do. And that's the distinction Blamires is speaking about: that we would walk by faith, not by sight. (2 Corinthians 5.7)

As we continue on in this Trinity Season, may the Lord help us to keep this in mind. May our frame of reference and the criteria by which we make our decisions reflect that we are the children of the Holy Trinity; citizens of the new Jerusalem; and heirs of the Kingdom of Heaven. The One Whom we love and worship has ways and means that are mysterious, and beyond our comprehension. "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the LORD. "As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." (Isaiah 55. 8-9)
