The Rector's Corner

What Mother Never Told Me About the Prayer Book (No. 13)

Last week, we reflected on the RULE OF LIFE (page 555) of the Prayer Book. This week, let's look at the Catechism which begins on page 544. Its subtitle is: AN INSTRUCTION TO BE LEARNED BY EVERY PERSON BEFORE HE (OR SHE) BE BROUGHT TO BE CONFIRMED BY THE BISHOP.

The purpose of the Catechism is to summarize the Christian Faith; and it does so in a question-and-answer format. Interestingly, as author Sue Careless points out, the very first question in the Prayer Book Catechism is a simple one: "What is your name?" The second is equally elementary: "Who gave you this name?" Although very basic, these questions are all about our identity. As Sue careless puts it:

"In asking this, the Catechism teaches us that our identity is not found primarily in our human family. (In answer the first question), we don't give our family name or surname but only our Christian name(s). Christians find their identity first and foremost in the family of God. The second question and answer make this abundantly clear:

Catechist: Who gave you this name?

Answer: My Godfathers and Godmothers in my Baptism: wherein I was made a member of Christ, the child of God, and an inheritor of the Kingdom of God."

This is a life-changing point: "Christians find their identity first and foremost in the family of God". In other words, regardless of what happens; no matter the ups and downs of this earthly life; and in spite of all the changes and challenges, disappointments and sadness we will experience, our identity is secure in Christ Jesus. We belong to God, and nothing can separate us from Him. (Roman 8. 39)

The last paragraph in the first section of the Catechism teaches us to make this response: "I heartily thank our heavenly Father that He has called me into this state of salvation, through Jesus Christ our Saviour. And I pray unto God to give me His grace, that I may continue in the same unto my life's end." Reflecting on this, Sue Careless has this helpful comment:

"At the very opening of the Catechism, the children are led to identity themselves **personally** with the life of faith and obedience to God.

... The whole point of the catechism that follows is to provide the children with the moral and spiritual formation they need, to live the Christian life with true faith and devotion."

The catechism gives us a lot to think about in an easy and readable format. It delivers big truths – like our identity and belonging — in simple words. ...So, let's use it in our daily devotions!

What does propitiation mean?

p. 78 of the BCP: "If any man sin, we have an advocate with the Father, Jesus Christ the righteous: and he is the propitiation for our sins." 1 John 2. 1, 2.

Propitiation means averting the wrath of God by offering a gift. Jesus Christ the righteous is the perfect and sufficient gift, or sacrifice, to make atonement for our sins. There is nothing without Jesus Christ, that we can offer up unto God for the remission of our sins.
