THE RECTOR'S CORNER

REMEMBRANCE DAY 2022

"I declare before you all that my whole life whether it be long or short shall be devoted to your service."

In 1945, Life Magazine published an article about Princess Elizabeth. It reported that King George VI had ruled that Elizabeth's training as a Princess outweighed the nation's increasing manpower problems and that "Betts" should not join any of the women's auxiliaries nor work in a factory. The King would not get his way. In April 1944, the young princess had turned 18. Her teenage years had been against the backdrop of the Second World War. Elizabeth was determined to do her "bit" for the war effort as so many of her peers were. Within a year of turning 18, she would sign up for service. It was an unprecedented decision – this would make her the first female in the Royal Family to become a full-time member of the Armed Services. It was a decision that would shape her life and reign.

At the outset of the war, King George and Queen Elizabeth decided they would not be seen hiding from the war. In September 1940, five bombs were dropped on Buckingham Palace. Rather than move away from the danger, they decided to remain at Buckingham Palace in solidarity with those living through the blitz. They made several visits to areas that had been bombed as well as to serving personnel, to munitions factories, to RAF bases and Royal Navy ships and to troops training for combat. They wanted to keep people's spirits up and took on the role of boosting morale with fervour.

Princess Elizabeth was just 13 when war broke out and her younger sister Margaret was 9. They were evacuated to Windsor Castle as it was felt to be safer there. She saw the work that her parents were doing to boost morale and she learned the importance of duty during times of national crisis. She carried out her first public duties during the war. On the morning of her 16th birthday, she inspected the Guards at Windsor Castle. At age 18, she launched her first ship, HMS Vanguard and performed some duties for her father when he was abroad.

Eventually, Elizabeth got her way and enlisted in the Auxiliary Territorial Service in February 1945. Princess Elizabeth enrolled in a driving and vehicle maintenance course. Her classes included mechanics theory, map reading and how to service, maintain and drive heavy military vehicles. The Princess was treated the same as the rest of her company and was able to mix with young people from different backgrounds which was

quite unusual for the time and attracted much press interest. They captured her dressed in overalls working on vehicle engines and changing tires and the press even named her "Princess Auto mechanic". Throughout her training Elizabeth worked for seven hours a day but did not stay in the barracks on site, she would return to Windsor Castle in the evening. After 5 months of training as a mechanic and truck driver at Camberley, the future queen was promoted to the rank of Honorary Junior Commander.

The young princess graduated as a fully qualified driver, but the war ended before she was able to make practical use of her new skills. To pass her final test, she made a solo journey in a heavy vehicle from Camberley in Surrey into London.

Just a few months later heralded the end of the war in Europe. On VE day, May 8, 1945, Princess Elizabeth joined her parents on the balcony of Buckingham Palace, along with the Prime Minister Winston Churchill, to greet the huge cheering crowds that had gathered to celebrate the end of the war in Europe. Later, on that day, the young princess was allowed to leave the Palace and mingle with the crowds anonymously. She later spoke of this when she was Queen saying it was one of the most memorable days of her life. She said: "We asked our parents if we could go out... I remember we were terrified of being recognized... I remember lines of unknown people linking arms and walking down Whitehall, all of us just swept along on a tide of happiness and relief." Princess Elizabeth was naturally quite serious and responsible even when she was young, and the war years really strengthened that aspect of her personality and provided the foundation of her later attitude towards duty when she became Queen.

Although the War ended in 1945, restrictions in Britain continued and the Royal Family followed suit. Rationing did not end until 1954 and Princess Elizabeth even saved up ration coupons to buy the material for her wedding dress in 1947. Just 7 years after the war, Elizabeth became Queen. This experience of coming of age during a war would play a pivotal role in shaping how she reigned and who she was.

She learned from her father the importance of the monarch being visible and present during times of national crisis which she adhered to for 70 years on the throne.

"I cannot lead you into battle. I do not give you laws or administer justice but I can do something else - I can give my heart and my devotion to these old islands and to all the peoples of our brotherhood of nations"

Theology Glossary

What does Dissemble and Cloak mean as it is used in the exhortation in the service of morning prayer on page 4 of the Book of Common Prayer?

“we are to acknowledge and confess our manifold sins... that we should not dissemble nor cloak them before God...”

Dissemble and cloak have basically the same meaning in that something is hidden or concealed. This confession is reminding us that we must not willfully try to hide our sins but confession them to God our Father. To think that we can hide our faults from God is futile as he sees us to our very core, and nothing can be hidden from him.
