The Rector's Corner

The decision last week of the Church of England to offer a blessing to same-sex couples is yet another downward step of the Body of Christ on her descent into utter humiliation. It is a step down because it is a step away from what God's Word teaches. For instance, over the past two weeks, at Morning and Evening Prayer, we have been reading from the Book of Genesis. In the opening chapter we read about the creation of Adam, the first man. God formed him "out of the dust of the earth and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life" (2.7). But it was not good for Adam to be alone, so the Lord made Eve, the first woman. And He said, "Therefore shall a man leave his father and mother, and shall cleave to his wife, and they shall be one flesh." (2.24)

God's perfect design was the creation of male and female, and Adam's completeness was found in Eve spiritually, physically and biologically. Sadly, Adam and Eve rejected God's plan when they listened to the serpent and ate from the tree of life. Everything went quickly downhill -- the whole creation felt the effects of this original sin. Even the ground was changed by it.

And so was the first family when Adam and Eve's son, Abel, was murdered by his brother, Cain. The thing is, our humanity became fallen or 'less than' – in its deepest part. Even our desires became infected to the debased extent of the men of Sodom, as we read in Genesis 19.5.

St. Paul spoke of this in his letters to the Church in Rome: "For although they knew God, they did not honor him as God or give thanks to him, but they became futile in their thinking, and their foolish hearts were darkened. For this reason God gave them up to dishonorable passions. For their women exchanged natural relations for those that are contrary to nature; and the men likewise gave up natural relations with women and were consumed with passion for one another, men committing shameless acts with men and receiving in themselves the due penalty for their error." (1.21, 26-27)

Over the past 25 years, under increasing pressure from the world, the Church has gradually stepped away from the Biblical understanding of sin and its effects on creation and on our human nature – including our sexual desires. In an attempt to pacify ourselves, without admitting our sinfulness, we began to determine what we believe (our doctrine)

by a democratic process at Synods. Instead of believing the Bible to be the inspired Word of God and the source of our Faith, we now 'make it up as we go along'.

Dr. Ephraim Radner reflects on this situation in his book <u>The Fate of Communion</u> (Eerdmans: 2006), asking: "What will happen if the gospel is, in fact, no longer recognized at the center of our church?" Then he puts forward this question: "What is God doing?" "Here," he says "we move into the realm of reflection upon God's providential ordering of the church's life, a form of theological and devotional discipline woefully under-practiced within modern Christian life".

Basically, Radner is asking 'why?' – 'Why would the Lord permit His Church – His own Body – the people He redeemed by His own Blood – to follow this wayward way?' In answering, he suggests that this is "the strange work of God...whose call to servanthood includes...the 'plucking up and breaking down' even as it does 'planting and building'". (Jeremiah 1.10) Radner continues by thinking about God's Word through the Prophet Jeremiah: "O house of Israel, can I not do with you such breaking down and plucking up that all might turn from and amend their ways and their doings? That I might again build up and plant? (Jeremiah 18. 6-11) – that is, might tear down for the sake of exaltation."

As we struggle; as we bear the humiliation of the church's state; as we bear the effects of the church's steps away from God's Word and His Way, we must, says Radner "frame our vision from the act of God". And, he says, that absolutely involves "the giving over of our witness to God's shaping judgement and mercy".

With you, I yearn for the day when the Church, the very Bride of Christ, will come to her senses and return her Lord with weeping and repentance. In the mean-time, may He help us to bear the humiliation of this cross and bear faithful witness to His power to heal, to revive and to raise us up.
