The Rector's Corner

Jesus took Peter, James and John up a mountain, where they beheld His figure clothed in dazzling glory and His conference with Moses and Elijah. Moses was the servant of God who received the Divine Covenant and delivered it to Israel; while the prophet Elijah was expected to come again and inaugurate the end of the ages, when I srael would be restored and vindicated in the sight of all nations. An account of Jesus' Transfiguration is included in each of the first three Gospels: Matthew, Mark, and Luke. In each, it serves as an epiphany – a manifestation of the truth that Jesus is not only the messenger of salvation but also the saving Message Himself.

The Transfiguration foreshadowed the Lord's Resurrection, and it gave a glimpse of what Heaven and the life of glory will be like. In speaking about what happened, each of the Gospels describes Jesus' clothing. For example, in today's Gospel, St. Matthew says, "His face did shine as the sun, and His raiment was white as the light". St. Mark wrote: "His clothes shone and became white like snow in such a manner that men on earth cannot make white." (9.3) St. Luke said this: "The appearance of His face was changed and His clothes became white and dazzling". (9.29)

We may contrast these descriptions with what happened at Calvary. At the Transfiguration, Jesus' clothes were not stripped off Him, as at the Crucifixion. In fact, His clothes became almost hard to look at. Saint Paul picked up on this in his second Letter to the Corinthians, where he spoke of the Christian hope in this way: "While we are in this earthly tent we sigh with anxiety; not that we would be unclothed, but that we would be further clothed, so that what is mortal may be swallowed up by life." Elsewhere Paul would speak of "putting on Christ" and of "being clothed with Christ".

We may consider from this, then, that Salvation will not be a stripping away of our humanity but a perfecting of it -- the donning of the vesture of glory. And so, the dazzling snow-white vesture of our Saviour at His Transfiguration points us to the heavenly life that awaits each one of us. Immediately, it is a sign of the transformation

He is bringing about within each believer by the power of the Holy Spirit. Alleluia! (adapted from <u>For All the Saints</u> compiled by Stephen Reynolds)
