

NB Health Link

NB Health Link is a new program aimed at providing access to health care for New Brunswickers who don't have a family doctor or nurse practitioner. This new network will help connect patients registered with the program to the health care they need, with in-person, telephone or online appointments in the official language of the patient's choice, while they wait for a longer-term placement with a family physician or nurse practitioner.

NB Health Link is an important part of the Province's commitment to help New Brunswickers get the health care they need, when and where they need it. The program focuses on providing a patient-centred, ongoing health care experience for New Brunswickers without a family doctor or nurse practitioner, supported by a centralized health record that follows patients with each of their appointments.

This primary care network of family doctors and nurse practitioners is available to treat many common medical conditions, prescribe medications, order tests and make referrals for specialized care. Once registered, patients are able to book appointments visiting the <u>program webpage</u> or by calling our toll-free number at 1-833-354-2300. Clinic hours will depend on availability, and can be viewed online or by calling the above toll-free number during the program's regular office hours: Monday to Friday, from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

The Rector's Corner

Each year on August 12th the Church in Canada commemorates Charles Inglis, the first Bishop of Nova Scotia, who worked diligently to establish the Anglican Church in what is now eastern Canada.

Inglis was born in 1734 in Ireland, the third son of the Revd. Archibald Inglis; but his father's death when Charles was only eleven left him with few options in either education or career. Unable to afford the costs of attending university, he was tutored privately by his older brother; and emigrated to the British colonies in North America when he was only 20. After four years working as a teacher in Pennsylvania, he sailed for Britain where he was ordained, soon after returning to Pennsylvania to work as a missionary.

After six years in a parish in Dover, he was appointed curate of Trinity Church in New York City. Following the British occupation of New York he was appointed Rector. It is recorded that Inglis prayed aloud for the King during a service when George Washington was present; after which the church was surrounded by militia.

Attacked for his loyalist leanings during the revolutionary period, he was forced to flee his home when New York was evacuated by the British forces at the conclusion of the war in 1783. At that time he returned to Britain where he stayed until 1787 when he was appointed to the newly created Diocese of Nova Scotia, which included responsibility for all British possessions in North America, including what are now New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island, Newfoundland, Quebec and Bermuda!

In spite of such large responsibilities, he was a diligent pastor to his churches, working to find and educate appropriate candidates for ordination, to establish new parishes, and to minister to a newly settled population of refugees. One of his most important accomplishments was the establishment of King's College in Windsor in 1789 to educate the future clerics and lawyers of the region. The first registered student at the new institution was his son John, whom he later ordained and who later became the third bishop of Nova Scotia.

Inglis worked to ensure that the Church in the new colony of New Brunswick was organized, establishing good working relationships with the missionaries appointed prior to his arrival, as well as with Thomas Carleton, the first colonial governor. In spite of the challenges of long-distance travel, he attempted to visit New Brunswick every few years, to confirm and ordain, to meet with his clergy, and to consecrate churches.

In his private time he took great pleasure in his orchards. He propagated several varieties of apples, one of which, Bishop's Pippin, still bears his name. He died while still in office in 1816 and was buried under the chancel in St. Paul's Church in Halifax. The Church throughout this period struggled with poverty, as one might imagine in a colonial outpost, but his efforts to overcome those challenges, together with the efforts of his son, laid a foundation upon which John Medley, the first Bishop of the Diocese of Fredericton in 1845, would later build so effectively. We join with the church in giving thanks this week for his faithfulness.
