THE RECTOR'S CORNER

"On this Remembrance Day I'm feeling grateful. The sacrifice and service of those in the Canadian Armed Forces has made our way of *life possible.*" (Naheed Nenshi, former mayor of Calgary) Remembrance Day is significant because it honours the sacrifice of those who gave their lives for peace. This day is a time to remember and not take for granted the freedoms Canadians enjoy today because of their sacrifice. The moment of silence during a Remembrance Day ceremony is a time to pause and show respect to those who lost their lives. It's a thank you for all of them.

For veterans still living, the day is an opportunity for reflection. "Its easy to get wrapped up in the business of life and social media", said a veteran from Newfoundland, "but we can never forget. We are in a safe place here in Canada, yet there are a lot of people in cemeteries who didn't have a chance to live, get older, and come back to a home." He concluded: "Its important that we take a moment now and then to reflect on the freedoms and peace in our lives, and to remember the men and women who served and sacrificed for all we have today."

Since 1914, more than 2.3 million Canadians have served their country and more than 118.000 sacrificed their lives in world conflicts, modern day military operations and peacekeeping. These events have lasting impacts on Canadians of all ages, especially those who have lost loved ones or are forced to live with the physical and mental scars of war. We must remember. If we do not, the sacrifice of those Canadian lives will be meaningless. They died for us, for their homes and families and friends, for a collection of traditions they cherished and a future they believed in; they died for Canada. The meaning of their sacrifice rests with our collective national consciousness. We often take for granted our Canadian values and institutions, our freedom to participate in cultural and political events, and our right to live under a government of our choice. The Canadians who went off to war in distant lands went in the belief that the values and beliefs enjoyed by Canadians were being threatened.

By remembering their service and their sacrifice, we recognize the tradition of freedom these men and women fought to preserve. They believed that their actions in the present would make a significant difference for the future, but it is up to us to ensure that their dream of peace is realized.
